Visibility in the community

In order to grow the Foundation, the board of directors felt it important to expand public awareness of our purpose and results. 2006-2007 Activities

Grants to Schools

Over \$39,000 of grants were approved for 27 schools this year. The projects continue to become more innovative. This year we approved a new garden at St. Charles Elementary School, Eagles on Air, a student radio station at Lindsay Place High School, participation of Macdonald High students in the Young Canadians Forum, story sacks for Riverview Cycle 1 children, a legal graffiti project at Beurling Academy, amongst other projects. We are also proud to continue our support of Space Day and the Bell Science Fair, benefiting learners across the school board.

Book Launch

The year could not have kicked off on a higher note than launching Phil Clavel's new book, *I Am Not An ATM Machine*. Phil entertained us all with readings from the book, providing food for thought for parents of children of all ages. A portion of the sale price of each book went to the Foundation.

Cupak Memorial Fund

The tragic loss of Commissioner Rona Cupak saddened the whole LBP community. The Rona Cupak Memorial Fund was created and, at the request of the family, the monies collected will be used to help disadvantaged students in our system. The Foundation purchased boots and snow pants this winter for over 25 children.

Born to Read

The Foundation continues to administer the finances of *le gout de lire / born to read* which was conceived and is being managed by a volunteer group of retired educators working through the CLSC Pierrefonds. This CLSC serves an area with one of the highest birthrates in Quebec and has a high percentage of families considered at risk. PEF directors John Killingbeck and Suanne Stein Day sit on the steering committee of this group.

The objective of *le gout de lire / born to read* is to work with families of newborns to encourage early literacy. Research has shown that children who experience daily reading activities from birth demonstrate greater school success later on. This success is most apparent in the area of language development.

We were delighted to welcome several new faces to the Golf Committee this year, particularly that of our chair, Ms. Viviane Croubalian and our honorary chair, Mr. Tony Proudfoot. The committee's efforts resulted in a wonderful day which resulted in proceeds over \$28,000 to the Foundation.

The weather held out to the very end, when a spectacular rain and hail storm gave our guests stories to last for months!

We just about filled the playing field with 275 players registered. 262 golfers played, received gifts from our sponsors, enjoyed a wonderful dinner at the Club de Golf Lachute and competed to win the Low Net Trophy now named in memory of Charleen Graham, a fondly remembered colleague and avid golfer

We have also made a number of new connections within the community members which should benefit us for many years to come. Over \$17,500 in sponsorships and many, many gifts and prizes were received this year. 117 organizations were listed as sponsors in the program that was distributed to all golfers.

We would be remiss if we didn't thank all the volunteers without whom the tournament would not exist. Their contributions are priceless.

Everest 2007 – Learning Without Limits

PEF had the unique opportunity to become involved with the project of Mr. Manuel Pizarro, integration aide at John Rennie High School, as he lived his lifelong dream of summittig Mount Everest.

Manny approached the Foundation last fall with his plan, which included raising funds that would be channeled back into education. Directors of the Foundation and members of the school board worked with Manny while he visited many of our schools talking about his preparations and the challenges he was facing. Manny excited our community about the adventure, which they were able to follow step by step through our website. The students were riveted while he talked about the mental and physical challenges facing him.

While Manny has not finished his fund raising efforts, we have already raised over \$5000 selling bracelets, patches and pins showing support, through the fashion show and a welcome back dinner held at Brasserie Hymus.

Fashion Show

Part of the Learning Without Limits activities was the sold out, 2nd annual fashion show featuring the works of Hollie D. Forrest and other local designers. Beautiful gowns and outfits were modeled by LBP students, with

hair and makeup being done by the students of the Gordon Robertson Centre.

Ms. Forrest, who has since agreed to join our board of directors, hopes to continue to raise funds for the Foundation through this now annual event.

Manson Learning Awards

The Margaret Manson Learning Awards were created in 2002 in memory of the late Margaret Manson, an innovative educator in our community. Each year, a monetary award and plaque of recognition is offered to a graduating student from each of our high schools, adult, and professional training centres. This year, the Alternative Network schools were also offered the opportunity to nominate recipients of the award.

Taking Risks

Responding to a call for "giveaways" for 50 high school students participating in the Peer Education Initiative designed for high school students, the Foundation purchased Cineplex Odeon gift certificates for each participant as a means to congratulate them on their initiatives. The Board of Directors is pleased to support these effective, out of the box, learning opportunities.

Visibility
